1. Look at the Explora home page and find the image at the top of the screen. What topic does it highlight? _____
2. Below the image, you’ll find buttons that show popular topics, people or current events. Clicking on each button changes the image.

3. Find the search box above the image at the top of your screen. Type *lion*. Click **Search**.

4. A **Topic Overview** appears in a box at the top of your result list. Click **Read more**.
What is the lion’s *order* and *species*? _____

5. Click **Back** at the top of the screen to return to your search results. Find the **All Filters** button at the top of your screen. You can use these to narrow your search results.

Click each filter type (such as **Date Range**, **Source Type** and **Lexile Range**) to show and hide the list of filters. Check and uncheck the boxes to add and remove filters. The number in parentheses next to a filter shows how many results are there.

Let's search by **Source Type**. Narrow your results to only **Magazine** articles about lions.

6. Find the **Sort** menu at the top right of your screen. This is another tool you can use to order your search results. **Relevance** puts your results in order of how closely they match your search terms.

Click the **Relevance** button. What are the other two choices for sorting your results?

7. Choose **Date Oldest** to reorder your results. Now oldest articles are listed first. Click an article title to open the full record. Write down the following:

This information helps you give an author credit for his or her work. Presenting someone else's words or ideas as your own is called *plagiarism*. Avoid plagiarism by *citing* any sources you use in your research paper or project.

8. Let's try another kind of search. Click the **Explora logo** to return to the home page. (Remember, you can use this feature any time you want to start over.)

Under **Explore topics**, below the image, you'll find some subject categories. Click the **Social Studies** category. Look at the list of topics.

b. Click **Date Range** in the **All Filters** tab. You can choose articles written in the last 12 months, past 5 years, past 10 years or a within a date range you choose.

- c. Click **Lexile Range**. Lexiles help you find articles that match your reading level. Your teacher will tell you which one to choose.
